POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS FOR FEBRUARY 16, 2014

In the absence of Clerk Larry Buffam, Asst. Clerk Anne Dalton clerked the meeting. In the absence of Recording Clerk David Connelly, Howard Nelson took minutes.

The meeting began with a little silence. The minutes from the January meeting for business were Anne read the State of Society query from NYYM: "How are faith, love, and ministry evidenced in your meeting?" The following responses were given by various Friends:

- Bill Sims at Cayuga Correctional Facility continually affirms that his connection to Poplar Ridge Friends helps sustain him and is an indication that our love extends to him. We also maintain a connection to the worship group in Auburn Correctional Facility.
- Another expression of loving concern is the care committees for various individuals which we oversee.
- Loving concern for children, their parents, and young adult Friends in our meeting is expressed through the First Day School program, multigenerational services, brunches, and other activities.
- We are blessed by our pastor's ministry to our community. **Many ministries known and unknown take the form of small tasks performed and helps to one another given.
- There is a sense of love manifested at the rise of meeting as we reach out in conversation to each other and to newcomers and visitors.
- Two on-going and vital Spiritual Nurture groups fill a need and help build community.
- One aspect of faith is the faith that "the meeting will be here" and will provide support in various ways.
- The pastor's messages and other vocal ministry encompass a faith community that contains a lot of variety. **The pastor and Ministry & Counsel Committee strive with

- "pro-active intentionality to build and nurture the fabric of our community"; M&C was cautioned to maintain openness and inclusiveness to the meeting as a whole.
- Poplar Ridge MM has been supportive of the recently formed Brooktondale Worship, which is under our care

After those present have a chance to review this summary and any suggestions and changes are incorporated, it will be sent to NYYM.

Next taken up was the letter from NYYM Priorities Working Group, which Christopher described as an effort to get a sense of monthly meetings' views of the work of NYYM. The following responses were given by various Friends:

- From reading SPARK, it is apparent that NYYM is already responsive to monthly meetings.
- NYYM's effort to be in communication with monthly meetings is appreciated, as is its efforts in ministrying Quakerism in many ways.
- Also appreciated is financial support in purchasing books used in a prison worship group.
- Other funds available through NYYM have been used by our meeting and these resources are appreciated. It was noted that an effort to make all monthly meetings more aware of these funds would be beneficial.
- There is usefulness in attending yearly meeting sessions, and this is more easily done when they are held in our region.
- It is good that the location of NYYM gatherings rotates from place to place.
- It is accurate to say that the focus of our energy of our monthly meeting is on our own worship and community life.
- We are grateful for the work of NYYM in administering aid to monthly meetings and in being a public voice for Quakerism.

Howard spoke for the Nominating Committee. Nominating Committee proposes a new committee to maintain the bulletin boards at the back of the meeting house, to keep material displayed up to date and uncluttered. Adding Bulletin Boards to the list of committees was approved. The Nominating Committee has completed its work for 2014. A roster of committees and proposed membership will be made available on paper at the rear of the meeting house and through PRISM. These committee lists are suggestions; approval takes place in Monthly Meeting for Business in April. Friends with comments or suggestions should make them to members of the Nominating Committee (Anne Dalton, Paul Simkin, Linda Simkin, Howard Nelson).

Anne reported that several young people are interested in attending FCNL's Lobby Weekend (March 22-25) and are requesting financial support from the Meeting. After discussion, it was approved to provide from the Houck Fund up to 85% of costs for individuals attending, with a maximum of \$1200 total contribution for the group. Baker was a founder of the Quaker community in Barker, New York and is believed to have been a "conductor" on the Underground Railroad. The Quakers, as a group, were very active supporters of the Underground Railroad network. The Barker Home is located on Quaker Road in Barker, New York.

Late 18th c. maps refer to a "great bridge," and open bridge near the fording site, south of the present structure. A covered bridge built over thecreek was replaced in 1841 and 1911. This area is the site of former textile mills.
