POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MINUTES JUNE 15, 2014

The Monthly Meeting opened with a period of worship about 11:45a.m. and approved of the minutes from the February meeting.

Attending: Ann Birch, Larry Buffam, David Connelly, Anne Dalton, Jim Frisch, Craig Kukuk, Jeff Layton, Julie Lockhart, Scott Lockhart, A.T. Miller, Sally Otis, Dill Otis, Hannah Richter, Christopher Sammond, Rebecca Schillenback, Jane Simkin, Linda Simkin, Paul Simkin.

We discussed when, where and schematically how to consider at a meeting for discernment on the direction of our Meeting, deciding we will do it Sunday July 27 at the rise of Meeting for Worship. Ruth's retirement at the first of next year is prompting this. Childcare will be provided. Anne will assemble queries and invites query suggestions.

To be considered for discussion:

- What the discernment process is: a meeting for worship with idea where do we want our meeting to grow.
- A worship sharing format.
- "Invisioning" what our meeting might be like, with or without
- The history of the Meeting's path to date; how the process of selecting a pastor worked for instance 15 years ago.
- Job description: the skills, interests and talents needed for

Sally reported for Ministry and Council that the revised Meeting Directory is almost finished and ready for previewing. Monthly Meeting agreed that asterisks will designate members or associate members. We ask everyone to review the Directory to be sure the information is correct.

Also, "We are holding Ruth's retirement in the Light and awaiting Monthly Meeting's direction how to proceed."

Dill reported for the Building Committee on the re-roofing project. The two contractors reviewed their bids, \$26,318 and \$31,500. The committee will meet next week to evaluate the considerable difference in the amounts. The difference may be the one group is self-insured for Workers Comp. The larger bidder is willing to take half paying the first year and half the next. There is \$20,150 in the roof fund to date. Monthly Meeting has already approved for the Building Committee to make a decision which contractor to use, but Dill express discomfort with his committee making that decision because of the price difference, but Monthly Meeting asked the committee to proceed.

Jeff raised the question about our building's insurance for its replacement in case of fire. It seems low to him. He will begin a conversation with our agent.

Scott reporting for the Youth Committee that the committee feels the Meetinghouse should have an infant changing table. He presented literature for a \$170 folding changing table. The Monthly Meeting approved the money from the General Fund.

Dill reports that the Cayuga Correctional Facility worship has not been suspended, as reported it would be last month. A Quaker prisoner leader has been transferred back, strengthening the meeting there.

Hannah raised a question about the Monthly Meeting paying for members leading worship during Ruth's sabbatical this summer. The Monthly Meeting referred the concern for clearness to Ministry and Council and the Finance Committee and to be reconsidered at next Monthly Meeting.

We approved of the Hazard Library using the Meetinghouse for its Summer Reading Program for the community June 26, July 10, 17,

The meeting closed about 1:20 p.m.

DID YOU EVER WONDER?

What is a Meeting for Discernment?

Meetings for Discernment are a time when members and attenders gather for extended worship without the weight of an agenda for business. Because Meetings for Discernment offer an occasion for the community to hear what is rising up among us, we are not asked to bring prepared messages, but rather to speak to the queries (or questions) as moved in the moment by Spirit, by God, by the Inner Christ. By meeting this way in the fullness of our community, we hear that which might not be heard in the midst of committees and attending to business. We strive for deep worship and grounded messages. (information from Patricia Loring, Spiritual Discernment, Pendle Hill Pamphlet 305 and NYYM website http://www.nyym.org)

"We have learned that God may speak through any of God's people; but also that only in gathered worship are we able to discern what the Spirit is saying to our community and how to act on this voice." (Spiritual Discernment, Quakers in Britain, http://www.quaker.org.uk/)

A Meeting for Discernment could focus on a particular query (question) or queries. As preparation, we invite Friends to consider the queries in light of the life of our Monthly Meeting. Quaker discernment is experiential and mystical and at its core is our commitment to follow the leadings of the Spirit in practice as well as in theory. We have learned that God may speak through any of God's people; but also that only in gathered worship are we able to discern what the Spirit is saying to our community and how to act on this voice. There are no handy lists of tests of discernment. However, the presence or absence of the fruits of the spirit which are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self control may indicate alignment with the Spirit. PASTORS IN POPLAR RIDGE

Poplar Ridge Friends Meeting has had pastors since before the meetinghouse was moved to its present location in 1897. The minutes recorded at that time give more attention to plans for construction of the parsonage next door than to the actual moving of the meetinghouse across the fields from its original location where Ridgeway Cemetery is now located.

Wilbur Camp was the last full time pastor *In* 1959 or 1960 when Orlo Stewart was asked to move to Poplar Ridge to become the pastor he agreed to do so on the condition that it be a part time position. Orlo and Ruth Stewart moved from the parsonage to their own home in the Octagon house North of the four corners. The parsonage was at first rented, then in 1978 it was sold. During the time that Orlo was pastor the meeting began having un programed worship on the last Sunday of the month and the period of silence was increased.

When Orlo retired in about 1978, there was very little delay in asking George Clarkson to regularly bring the messages. George had substituted for Orlo in the pulpit during a period of time when Orlo had asked to be released to work full time on remodeling the Octagon house. George advised the meeting to sell the parsonage, explaining that he would continue to live in his home in Danby and that it was unlikely that we would again have a pastor who would choose to live in a parsonage. At the time that George began to bring the messages on a regular bases he was paid for each time that he preached. He had a full time job in the religion department at Ithaca College and was not expected to perform other pastoral services.

Over the time that George Clarkson served the Poplar Ridge Meeting his circumstances changed and his role with the meeting gradually changed. He was eventually designated as pastor, received a regular salary and reimbursement for some of his travel. He did some home visiting and some pastoral counseling with people who requested it. Other services he performed for the meeting were not catalogued. He also did some carpentry work at the meetinghouse.

When George retired, a search committee was named and some advertising was done among Friends. Bill Fairhurst, had joined the meeting after he retired from a position as pastor in Weedsport. Since recruitment efforts from outside the meeting were unsuccessful, Bill was asked to become our pastor, which he did for about one year. When Bill left for health reasons there was another search process. Of the people with whom the possibility of coming to Poplar Ridge was discussed, it seemed that one factor was that no one was willing to relocate to our area for a part time job.

It was at this point in a where do we go from here session at our monthly meeting for business that things began to fall in place for Ruth Bradley to become our pastor.

In a few cases it has been easy to check dates and verify details. In other instances this relies on the memory of Paul and Jane Simkin


Annual Hazard Library Book Sale is August 2nd–9th at the Poplar Ridge Fire House on Rte. 34B.

"Harriet Tubman and Emily Howland's Hope"

Hear how these two women desired to start a School for Girls at the Harriet Tubman Home in Auburn. Presenter **Dr. Douglas Armstrong**, Professor of Anthropology at the Maxwell School, Syracuse University, has done extensive archeological research at the Tubman House, combining that exploration with his interest in social reform in our region. "The Antislavery Movement and the Tactics of Gerrit Smith"

Smith was criticized for the tactics he used in that fight, but in the long run, they were successful. Smith operated a very active underground railroad (UGRR) station in Peterboro and managed a land sales business that allowed him to be philanthropic, so he became the most powerful abolitionist in the country. Presenter **Dr. Norman Dann** is a retired professor from Morrisville State College, active member of historic organizations in Peterboro, and published author on topics including slavery, Gerrit Smith, and the UGRR.

August 17, 2014 7:00 p.m.

"Abraham Lincoln and his connection to Old Homer Village, New York"

This talk will highlight three early Homer residents whose professional lives were intertwined with President Lincoln and his administration. Presenter **Len Cohen**, Homer resident, is a retired History Bibliographer at the State University at Cortland's Memorial Library. Of late, his interest has been piqued by the work of Homer's town historian Martin Sweeney. Sweeney's book, *Lincoln's Gift From Homer*, *New York* was recognized by the Lincoln Forum as part of the celebration of the Sesquicentennial of the Civil War.

"Eagles of Cayuga Lake"

An informative photo program about the comeback of the American Bald Eagle along Cayuga Lake. Presenter **Glenn Gaston** is a local photographer; he will also be presenting the photo workshop on Sept. 21.

"How to Search Your Family Tree"


