POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MINUTES FOR APRIL 19, 2015

The Monthly Meeting opened with a period of worship about 12:15 p.m. Attending were Ruth Ann Bradley, David Connelly, Anne Dalton, Craig Kukuk, Jeff Layton, A.T. Miller, Sally Otis, Dill Otis, Andrew Simkin, Elizabeth Simkin, Jane Simkin, Karen Simkin, and Paul Simkin,

Two annual reports were read first thing, a change from our usual agenda, because some members need to leave early. The annual reports will be published in Prism over the next several months.

Karen Simkin offered the Membership Report; membership is at 78 full members and 16 associate members, a total of 94. Eleven of the 16 associate members are youth members, which is to say, under the age of 18.

Jeffrey Layton, Treasurer, summed up the Finance Committee report, which included a three-year financial snapshot of the Meeting, with now a \$52,373,09 total in accounts, including \$21,189.66 in operating.

To date, we have spent about 30 percent of the 2015 budget. Income to date is about \$9,400, or 26 percent of that budget.



Jeff reported that Yearly Meeting is not giving us money we requested for the roof this year. Finance Committee will meet soon to address how to close that deficit of \$2.934.

Minutes from the March Monthly Meeting were read next.

Sally reported for Ministry and Council the following:

• The Clearness Committee for Membership met with Craig Kukuk and recommended that he be accepted to membership. Monthly Meeting approved Craig as a member.

- A Soup and Sharing is planned for after the rise of meeting May 3 on Quaker worship.
- Following Soup and Sharing May 3, volunteers from our Meeting under the auspices of Embrace The Lake will clean up a portion of the shore assigned to them.

Sabrina Stedge and Steven Saville, who are not Meeting members or attenders, request use of our Meetinghouse for their marriage on August 15 with an estimated attendance of 100 people. We approved.

After reviewing nominations submitted by the Nominating Committee for committee assignments and officers, we made the appointments for the 12 months beginning now. Among those appointments is Ruth Bradley to Nominating Committee. All appointments are attached.

We heard the annual reports from the following committees: Building (Dill), Historical Materials (Jane), Ministry and Council (Sally), Outreach (Anne Dalton), Peace and Social Action (Andrew), Prism (Mary Lou), Cayuga Correctional (Dill), Social Committee (Hannah), Telephone Tree (Sally, incorporated in M&C report), Southern Cayuga Wider Parish (Ruth), and New York Yearly Meeting (Ruth). Those appointments are attached and will be published in the next editions of Prism.

Anne Dalton introduced additional changes to the Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting brochure. They were approved.

Andy Simkin has suggested that Monthly Meeting find a way to review the upcoming monthly calendar, just for awareness.

To avoid competing with Spring Gathering next month, Monthly Meeting will be on May 24.

We approved the Hazard Library's use of our Meetinghouse for four events the coming summer.

Andrew reported on the Farmington Friends Meeting's one-day workshop on clerking on April 18, which he and Anne Dalton attended and about 30 people. Arthur Larrabee led it. Andy and Anne found the session very useful.

The Meeting closed after a period of silence at 2:45 p.m.

STATE OF THE MEETING CAYUGA CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

We reflected on these queries in preparing our State of the Meeting report

- quality of worship and spiritual ministry
- efforts to foster spiritual growth
- stands taken on Friends' principles
- · personal and family relations

In thinking about the above queries, several members wrote down their personal reflections. This state of the meeting report is a compilation of those reflections.

The twice monthly meetings held at Cayuga Correctional Facility are without question—Wonderful We at Cayuga worship group have experienced some very exciting spiritual and emotional encounters during our meetings. It is there that we are able to relax and express our most inner feelings and thoughts. We can be open, not only to others but to ourselves.

There are several advantages to have a faith based on Quaker beliefs "A guiding premise of Quakerism is that our actions are as important as our basic beliefs and ought to reflect those beliefs." I find this quote to reflect the theme of Quakerism. And of all the aspects, I am impacted the most by the form of worship... "Simplicity". During worship the level of concern is second to none.

Each member at the meeting always shares with the group what is happening in their relationships with family and friends to the point where it generates concern and discussion. Even the smallest thought has a chance of developing into a valuable spiritual experience. The encouragement and inspiration that are displayed in our worship group create a significant opportunity for spiritual growth, Our meeting provides us with a conducive atmosphere so vital for spiritual growth, love and mutual support.

Members often share with the group various situations when they had to rely on principles which they have embraced through our meetings. In view of our limited access to the outside world and certain restrictions placed upon us we are often dismayed that we are not able to interact more frequently on such a profound level.



Everyone shares experiences they have undergone recently. The spirit of Christ can be felt within and around everyone at the meeting.

When you enter into our meeting, a sudden sense of excitement and anticipation sets in reassuring you that you are at the right place at the right time. We enter into silent worship at our meeting for at least 30 minutes which gives us a chance to connect with our inner selves and experience a heightened sense of peace allowing a deep spiritual focus to emerge.

During worship service I am not required to dot my 'i' s or cross my 't's. I only need to be conscious of myself and others.

Our meeting gives us an avenue to renew, cultivate and express our spiritual beings with confidence and freedom. We are able to connect with one another emotionally and spiritually because at the highest point of our meeting we become as one and the same.

When I combine my religious upbringing with my religious exploration I find myself neutral. In previous teaching, God was described as supreme but in practice I observed that God was often used as an excuse for different behaviors. It appeared to me that some worship activities seemed require a certain amount of college experience. Today I am proud of my current state of religious progress.

We discuss important current events that have had or could have an impact on our everyday living.

We read books that are motivational and inspirational. The current book we are reading is "The Wisdom to know the Difference" by Eileen Flanagan. Every attender, after taking a turn reading, has an undeniable sense of peace and calm. We have something to reflect and meditate on throughout our days when not in meeting for worship.

There are few things I look forward to these days and the Quaker Meeting is one of those things. This is when I am clearly reminded that the dictionary is the only place where success comes before work.

Members that come in from the outside bring such a refreshing and invigorating attitude that it eradicates all the elements of prison life. In looking forward to each and every meeting it is sometimes very difficult to be patient because it is such a rewarding and intriguing experience. Anticipation can be overpowering.
