POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MINUTES FOR DEC. 11, 2016

The Monthly Meeting opened with a period of worship about 11:50 a.m.; the minutes from the Nov. 20 meeting were read.

Attending were Larry Buffam, David Connelly, Anne Dalton, Barry Kahn, Jeff Layton, Suzanne O'Hara, Dill Otis, Sally Otis, Hannah Richter, Christopher Sammond, Andrew Simkin, Jane Simkin, and Paul Simkin.

We revisited Barry Kahn's wish to address the Upstate Citizens for Equality "No Sovereign Nation" sign at the Triangle on Ridge Road and State Route 34B in Scipio. We decided to refer Barry's concerns to Ministry and Council and his care committee.

We reached clarity on the proposed 2017 operating budget as presented by Jeff Layton of the Finance Committee. We decided to rename the General Fund the "General/Capital Fund" and set aside \$2,500 from the Operating Budget for 2017 in anticipation of future capital needs. We added \$200 to our FC&L contribution. We approved using the Jamison Fund for our outside contributions. We will publish the proposed 2017 budget in PRISM and reconsider it for final approval at the January Monthly Meeting.

Reporting on the basement renovations, Larry Buffam said the Children's Room work is substantially complete, and a coatrack will be installed by next week's events. Shelving and trim still need done. He suggests doing kitchen renovations next year. We may need to replace windows, add siding and insulation there. Work would begin in spring or summer.

We decided to display a smaller, artificial Christmas tree this year. Some people attending our worship meetings are allergic to a real fir tree.

The Meeting's contract with Craig Kukuk for Pastoral Care has been approved through 2017. We no longer consider it an interim arrangement.

We approved Jane Simkins' request for a wooden sign to be added to our outside Welcome Sign offering a welcome in Spanish, "Bienvenidos." Hannah Richter will clerk the committee coordinating our hosting a New York Yearly Meeting's Meeting for Discernment on March 11. Others serving on the committee are Christopher Sammond, Joanne Rogers, Andrew Simkin, and Anne Dalton.

Suzanne O'Hara asked for guidance how to handle emails she receives from Quaker organizations. We asked her to place them on our Facebook page and ask meeting members familiar of the organizations sending the emails to create blurbs to publish in PRISM describing the kind of emails the organizations send and inviting Friends to sign up to receive them.

We closed with a moment of silence at 2:02 p.m.

PROPOSED REVISION TO FAITH AND PRACTICE

Our Yearly Meeting's Committee to Revise Faith and Practice has adopted a protocol of directly advising each monthly meeting when a proposed revision to our Book of Discipline is being considered. I write to advise you that, at Fall Sessions, one such proposal was given a first reading.

The proposed language appears below, and is intended to replace similar language that now appears at p. 122 of the 2014 printed version of *Faith and Practice*:

SPIRITUAL CARE OF MEMBERS. Seeking divine guidance in their discernment, members of ministry and counsel should seek to:

- foster the spiritual growth of the meeting membership and enhance their religious life and fellowship, including especially the nurture and strengthening of corporate worship of the meeting;
- consider individual needs for guidance and to make provision for personal counsel and assistance in matters of interpersonal relationships among members;
- assist individuals and families confronting problems pertaining to illness, financial matters, marital relations, and decisions of conscience, keeping in mind at all times the limits of ministry and counsel's expertise;
- review annually the spiritual condition of the meeting and its membership and to write the State of the Meeting reports;
- develop programs and conferences, study groups, and public meetings to disseminate information regarding Friends' spiritual concerns and to assist members and attenders to deepen the life of the spirit;
- where desired by local meetings, consider qualifications and make recommendations concerning recording gifts in ministry or engagement of pastors or meeting secretaries;
- foster a meeting culture that encourages the emergence of gifts, and assures support and accountability for Friends who carry individual gifts in ministry.

These proposed revisions were prompted by the adoption, at Summer Sessions 2015, of a modification to our discipline on "Care of Ministries and Recording of Gifts in Ministry." This modification was adopted by the Body after the printing of the 2014 version of *Faith and Practice*, and may be found at pp. 55-57 of the 2015-16 Yearbook (the one with the yellow cover). The proposal now before us makes clear that monthly meeting Ministry and Counsel has the responsibility to identify and support Gifts in Ministry, as well as all gifts within the monthly meeting.


