POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MINUTES APRIL 23, 2017

The Monthly Meeting and Annual Meeting opened with a period of worship about 11:35 a.m.; the minutes from the March 19, 2017 meeting were read.

Attending were Ruth Bradley, Larry Buffam, David Connelly, Anne Dalton, Jim Frisch, Barry Kahn, Jeff Layton, A.T. Miller, Cathy Mullarney, Suzanne O'Hara, Dill Otis, Sally Otis, Hannah Richter, Jane Simkin, Karen Simkin, Paul Simkin, and Charlie Weld.

This is our Annual Meeting. We heard the following reports. They and the other committee annual reports will be attached electronically and again be collected in a binder in the Meeting's Library. Suzanne O'Hara asked that all reports be submitted to the Recording Clerk, David Connelly, who will forward them to her.

- From Financial Committee by Jeff Layton. He
 offered two reports: the financial report and a
 report on expenses and contributions year-todate.
- Karen Simkin reporting for Statisticians said we have 93 total members, 77 regular and 16 associate (11 youth). We realized that Alfred Jamison who died in North Carolina May 27, 2016 is still listed as a member, so membership will be updated.
- For the Building and Grounds Committee,
 Larry Buffam submitted its report. It will be
 updated to include mention of the ad hoc
 committee's creation and development of the
 Meditation Garden this year. The Meeting
 expressed its appreciation for the considerable
 Building Committee work during the last
 twelve months.
- The Clerk read the Library Committee's annual report submitted by Stephanie Nelson.
- Ministry & Counsel's report was read by Dill Otis. It will be amended.
- For the Nominating Committee: Its report was submitted by Ruth. Additionally, Sally mentioned that a new Treasurer will be needed.

- Jeff will service for more year and we need someone to be trained starting in October.
- Sally reported that the Nominating Committee
 is seeking representatives to attend Yearly
 Meetings, which meets three times a year, and
 a New York Yearly Meeting's Meeting for
 Discernment. Those Yearly Meeting's reports
 are included on its website.
- New also is a Gardens Committee separate from Building and Grounds Committee.
- We approved the appointment of two new members of the Nominating Committee, Anne Dalton and Craig Kukuk. if he is willing to sever, for the term ending in 2020.
- We approved the appointments listed on the list of Nominations.
- The Outreach Committee report was read by Anne Dalton.
- Andy read the Peace and Social Action Committee report as prepared by Trudy Buxembaum.
- Suzanne read the PRISM Committee report written by Mary Lou Charles.
- Religious Education/Youth committee report will be submitted after Youth Day in June.
- The Social Committee report was read and submitted by Cathy Mullarney.
- Sally Otis reporting for the Telephone
 Tree/Directory saying that Laura Buffam is
 updating the Directory, and the Telephone Tree
 will be updated as well.

As part of our Monthly Meeting for Business, we approved Anne Dalton's draft of our State of Society Report we will submit to New York Yearly Meeting. It is attached here.

Andrew Simkin thanked Anne Dalton for her service as Assistant Clerk, Clerk, and again Assistant Clerk, a four-year cycle. Hannah Richter is stepping onto that rotation now.

Reporting for Ministry & Counsel Committee, Dill said Rebecca Schillenback will continue giving talks through August, and because of her heavy course load wrapping up her degree, she needs time off. The committee will be addressing how or whether to replace her monthly talks. Ministry & Counsel will discuss with her what other help she may need.

Christopher Sammond requests a Minute of Travel endorsing and supporting his spiritual concerns. A Monthly Meeting Care Committee for Christopher has been meeting regularly with him and between them and our Ministry & Counsel a draft was prepared, read today and approved.

Andrew mentioned that a Cayuga County Immigration Meeting has been held by the chairman of the county Legislature, Keith Batman, who asked our clerk whether we would participate in helping the county decide how to support immigrants. Andy told him we would, and discussions are ongoing.

We approved Hannah's request for \$200 to \$300 to attend the FGC meeting this summer.

There is still need for help cleaning the meetinghouse after May, and Andrew reported a good experience with services he used at the Phoenix Building at \$25 an hour. We will try it out in June.

Suzanne has replaced some parts in the transmitter for the sound system, which is more powerful now.

Dill has installed a grab bar donated by Barry in the upstairs bathroom.

We closed with a moment of silence at 2:08 p.m.

SINGING A LA NIGHTINGALES

Nightingales is a Northern Yearly Meeting acappella singing group that Friends in NYYM have enjoyed for the last eight years, being hosted by various Friends across our broad geography. Getting together and singing as the Nightingales do it is about singing from the heart. It is not about being a great singer. It is about being in a community singing with love. If you were told by your kindergarten teacher to "just mouth the words," because "you can't sing," you can sing. If you can talk, you can sing. We sing from Rise Up Singing and Worship in Song, but we often bring songs or rounds we have encountered to teach each other. We go around in a circle, and every person present, even the very youngest, gets to name a song they want sung, and if the person wants, they set the pitch for it, too. There are also times when we break into song without books and without structure, our hearts leading us from one song to another, one genre to another, sacred, silly, schmaltzy, rounds, hymns, show tunes- we wander into some amazing bayous of song.

These weekends are also about fellowship and food. We all bring food to share, and have pot-luck meals that we take turns organizing and cleaning up after. And we tell about our lives. We do that in words, and in the songs we initiate, for there is little more revealing than the song in your heart. Sometimes we sing our way into the truth of who we are, and receive that from the singing.

Those that can camp, do so, or sleep in sleeping bags on the floor. Those that need a bed, due to age or physical need, can ask for one with local Friends. We charge a small fee for breakfast staples, but otherwise we do everything ourselves, so the cost is negligible. If this sounds like fun to you, please come, and bring those you love with you.

Shuttle service from Syracuse Amtrak station is a possibility. Children are most welcome, though those not wanting to participate in the singing are the responsibility of their parents.
