QUAKER MEETING IN SPANISH

Quaker Meeting in Spanish continues to meet on one evening each month. The small size of the group does not reflect the large value to the native Spanish speakers who attend. The attenders include two regulars and four others from two households who come irregularly. There is also a core group of English speakers, who speak or understand Spanish, which provide transportation for attenders who do not have cars. They would welcome suggestions on outreach to native Spanish speakers, particularly from anyone who would offer to help implement their suggestion. The meeting begins with a reading in Spanish, which is distributed in written form, followed by sharing from the silence. Sometimes music is included or there is food to share afterwards, but always the fellowship seems to be rich and meaningful to all.

The schedules of regular participants and other meeting events are consulted to plan the night each month. Usually, the third Wednesday of the month has been the best night to meet, but the actual night may vary each month. Schedule changes are communicated in English by e-mail and as an announcement following Meeting for worship on the Sunday preceding Quaker Worship in Spanish. PASTORAL LETTER FROM HIS EXCELLENCY MONSIGNOR SALIEGE, ARCHBISHOP OF TOULOUSE

On "human dignity", read out from the pulpit on August 23, 1942 without comment.

My very dear Brothers,

There is a Christian morality, a human morality, which lays down duties and recognizes rights. These rights and duties stem from the nature of man; they come from God. One can violate them... [but] no mortal has the power to do away with them.

Children, women, men, fathers and mothers being treated like a lowly herd; members of a single family being separated from each other and carted away to an unknown destination - it is our age which was destined to see this dreadful sight.

Why is there no longer any right of asylum in our churches?

Why are we the defeated? Lord, have pity on us. Our Lady, pray for France.

In our diocese, moving scenes have occurred in the camps of Noe and Recebedou. The Jews are men; the Jewesses are women. The foreigners are men and women. One may not do anything one wishes to these men, to these women, to these fathers and mothers. They are part of the human race; they are our brothers, like so many others. A Christian cannot forget this.

France, beloved Fatherland; France, which bears in the consciences of all your children the tradition of respect for human dignity; chivalrous and generous France - I have no doubt that you are not responsible for these errors.

And a little less of me.


Let me be a little braver
