**POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY
MEETING FOR BUSINESS
MINUTES FOR FEB. 21, 2016**

The Monthly Meeting opened with a period of worship about 12:00 p.m.; the minutes from the January meeting were read. Andrew Simkins clerked the meeting.

Attending were David Connelly, Anne Dalton, Jim Frisch, Dill Otis, Sally Otis, Hannah Richter, Andrew Simkin, Jane Simkin, Linda Simkin, and Paul Simkin.

Sally Otis reported for Ministry and Council:

- The committee recommends that Ruth Bradley and Charlie Weld and Andy and Bess Simkin serve on the oversight committee for the marriage of Heidi Richter and Dru Schlichtmann. Monthly Meeting approved.
- Anne and Sally met with Craig Kukuk to complete his annual performance evaluation.

Dill Otis reported for the Building Committee. He offered the following report:

- Jay has also built and installed an hour meter on the furnaces to determine how much oil each of the furnaces burn.
- The committee hesitates to recommend more decades of burning fossil fuels. The committee does not believe it is dangerous to continue running for a while; there does not seem to be an immediate fire risk. Since the report, Todd Rafferty also inspected our furnaces and did not see an immediate risk. So far, the carbon monoxide monitor has registered no presence of the gas.

The Monthly Meeting approved the committee's plan to insulate the whole basement this summer. The committee will return to Monthly Meeting for final approval once details are worked out.

The Monthly Meeting approved forwarding to Farmington-Scipio Quarterly Meeting the following Memorial Minute for William Sims, who died June 26, 2015. Bill was born Sept. 6, 1933.

"... Bill led a rich and fruitful life in spite of his long confinement in maximum security prisons. His acceptance, and welcome into membership by Poplar Ridge Meeting was a special source of joy:

for Bill, for Poplar Ridge Friends Meeting, and for Friends everywhere.

"On the day he died he had served 43 years of a life sentence in maximum security prisons in New York State.

"It is unusual to provide a memorial minute for a prisoner, and it is unusual for a prisoner to be a full member of a Friends Meeting. He was a special man.

"Life in a maximum security prison is very restricted. You do not get to do what you would like to do, to go where you would like to go, or to see people you would like to see. This is true, every hour of every single day and in Bill's case for 43 years.

"Bill attended Friends Meeting for Worship for the first time in 1975 inside Auburn Prison. This meeting was the first-ever Friends Meeting for worship held in any New York State Prison. He became a faithful attender and supporter of the Friends worship group in Auburn Prison, and served as clerk for many years. In 1978, the group became the Auburn Prison Preparative Meeting through acceptance by the Farmington-Scipio Regional Meeting.

"In the years that followed Bill developed close friendships with many outside Friends in the region.

"He liked to send artistic handmade greeting cards to his friends. However, he was always careful not to write on the card, so the friend could use it as new. You would find his friendly message on a separate insert with the card.

"Bill attended the second-ever Alternatives to Violence Workshop in a New York State prison at Auburn in 1978. In subsequent years he facilitated workshops, and provided the communication and trust-building essential to the program's success. Prison administrators and guards, prisoners, and Quaker/AVP volunteers, all trusted Bill.

"Bill was a pioneer. There are active AVP programs in 18 New York State prisons today. There are Quaker worship groups in 11 New York State prisons today

"In prison he completed college, obtaining a Syracuse University degree. He completed a

Master's degree from the University of Buffalo. He developed remarkable artistic skill.

"He met, courted and married Dorothy Gowin, a member of Syracuse Friends Meeting.

"He was in prison, maximum security prison. He had no power, no resources, limited contacts and telephone calls. He did have the resources of a thoroughly good man, and it was enough. □□

"He had the power suggested by the Quaker quote,

"Let us see what Love can do."

Anne will look into the possibility of forwarding the Memorial Minute to other publications.

The Ministry and Counsel Committee met to discuss the State of the Meeting report, which to be forwarded to New York Yearly Meeting by mid-March. We have asked A.T. Miller and Rebecca Schillenback to offer their perspective. The two have incorporated their thoughts onto a single document, which we reviewed.

The Yearly Meeting's query is this: *"What is the spiritual condition of your Meeting? We are looking for in-depth reflection on the essence of what makes us Friends with the understanding that our spiritual lives are reflected in many different ways."* We made minor changes and will consider including other suggestions before approving it at our next Monthly Meeting.

Jane Simkin reported that we now have housekeeping covered for April, May, June and the first few weeks of March. Remaining to be done is the last week of March, and July till the end of the year.

We were reminded that our Annual Meeting is April 10 this year. Committee clerks should have their reports done by that date.

The Nightngales Weekend of Song and Fellowship will be here April 22, 23 and 24; they will be part of our Family Night supper and program, at which all our welcome. A representative of the Friendly Folk Dancers told us they could be here Thursday or Friday, the 28th and 29th. We decided to decline this year because we are overcommitted that month.

We closed with silence at 1:51 p.m.

NYYM CLERK'S LETTER – COORDINATING COMMITTEE WEEKEND NEWS

Dear Friends,

New York Yearly Meeting's coordinating committees met in January at Powell House. I visualize the four coordinating committees as sturdy legs of a table, supporting work that ranges from prison ministry to financial transparency to great programs for children and teens at Yearly Meeting sessions.

The coordinating committees hear reports from the committees under their care—yes, leave it to Quakers to have committees to coordinate committees. If you'd like more information, visit [the yearly meeting's web page for its committees](#). But in the grassroots way that small and large meetings across the yearly meeting manage to be both particular to themselves and related to one another, the coordinating committee structure works. I sat in on a report on Moral Mondays in Albany and heard moving testimony on these vigils. Sara Niccoli, mentioned in a post on Moral Mondays, is a member of Perry City Monthly Meeting: blogs.nysut.org/blog/2014/03/20/moral-mondays-call-for-a-fair-new-york/. Regina Haag also participates. As we worked, we soaked up every bit of Ann Davidson's warm hospitality, knowing she is retiring soon as Powell House Director, and we were delighted to welcome Regina and her husband Dennis as soon-to-be Directors.

The committee that is blessed with the opportunity to read the 2015 State of the Meeting reports now arriving from monthly meetings reported on their work. It may seem at times that the State of the Meeting reports disappear into the ether, but they are read by real people with hearts and minds moved by what they read and working hard to write from them a report that will go out as our State of Society. Much work was done—I have mentioned only a small fraction. But there was also time for sitting around the fire and sharing Instagram photos of the trip six NYYM members made to Peru for Friends World Committee for Consultation (fwcc.world/). And we had time for reflection in small groups about what it was like to be busy in this way, away from our monthly meetings. For some of the Friends gathered it is a sacrifice, for some a gift of growth and deepening in service, for some it is hard to tell the difference. Some wish for a way to be more grounded in their monthly meetings, some wish their monthly meetings knew more about their work on Yearly Meeting committees. Some Friends from small meetings feel strengthened by the presence of the forty or so people gathered in worship, others by the sense of connection to Friends engaged in active witness. There is a sense that there is more work to be done than hands to do it, but there is also a sense that God is using us well.

A member of my meeting used to joke that he didn't belong to any organized religion. Because it is flexible and open to continuing revelation our structure may not look like a typical organization chart, but coordinating committee weekend is evidence that our independent, thoughtful souls are housed in a structure that fosters deep listening for the movement of Spirit.
