### POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MINUTES FOR JANUARY 21, 2018

It is time to begin thinking about getting our meeting's State of Society report together. NYYM can only truly discern the state of our society if we all participate. We will discuss our meeting's response to the query at the February Meeting for Business.

**QUERY:** What is the current state or condition of your Meeting (or Worship Group)?

**Guiding Questions:** If you are in need of additional structure, we offer five guiding questions. These are not required but may assist your Meeting or Worship Group in finding direction.

- 1. What is the spiritual condition of your meeting, committee, or worship group? Where is there light? Where is there darkness?
- 2. Are meetings for worship and business held in expectant waiting for divine guidance? How do we feel about the quality of our worship and ministry?

- 3. How are love and unity fostered among us? If differences arise, how do we endeavor to reconcile them in a spirit of love and truth? How well do we do?
- 4. How do we make ourselves available in a tender and caring way when we sense a need for assistance in time of trouble? Do our members and attenders trust each other enough to make their needs known to others in the meeting, committee, or worship group?
- 5. How do we acknowledge the oneness of humanity and foster a loving spirit toward all people? Do we honor Friends' traditional testimony that all people are equal? How do we work to make these ideals a reality?

### CHILDREN IN FRIENDS MEETINGS

Excerpts taken from the NYYM Faith and Practice

Friends have a particular responsibility to bring children under the loving care of the meeting. Friends should be sensitive to the needs of these young people, nurturing their spiritual well-being and helping them grow into mature and concerned members.

Children remind us of the miracle of life and of the continuing opportunity for renewal. We recognize that children have that of God in them as do adults. We are called, therefore, to treat them with respect and dignity and to stay in dialogue with them. While their abilities and 'weightiness' vary according to their experience and clarity, we cherish the contributions that they make to family, meeting, and social life.

"Our children are given to us for a time to cherish, to protect, to nurture, and then to salute as they go their separate ways. They too have the light of God within, and a family should be a learning community in which children not only learn skills and values from parents, but in which adults learn new ways of experiencing things and seeing things through young eyes. From their birth on, let us cultivate the habit of dialogue and receptive listening. We should respect their right to grow into their own wholeness, not just the wholeness we may wish for them."

Each evening begins at 5:00 PM in the host church with a crock-pot soup offering. Soups are provided by the many churches in the Wider Parish with each attendee encouraged to bring their own soup bowl, utensils, and mug. Drinks (coffee, tea, water, punch) will be provided. The evening's presentation will begin at 5:45 PM and conclude not later than 7:00 PM.

### A short description of each presentation:

18 Feb: Occasionally we hear the refrain, "I'm not religious but I am spiritual." This can become an offering of understanding for not attending church. Oftentimes these same proponents are deeply engaged in communication forms utilizing the newly minted technologies of social media: Snapchat, FB, Twitter, Instagram, and others. A reframed understanding of social media can assist in experiencing the spiritual with the consequence of discovering a deeper relationship between religion and spirituality.

25 Feb: Howard Nelson and Charlie Weld will share poetry they have written as well as poetry written by others they choose to read. They will share how the writing of poetry leads into their own spirituality.


4 March: Surprise is the beginning of philosophy as well as the beginning of gratefulness. There are degrees of grateful wakefulness. Great truths can be found in moments of surprise. The degree to which we are awake to this truth is a measure of our gratefulness. We will take a closer look at this process of awakening. It is the growth process of gratefulness.

11 Mar: A fresh reading of ancient texts can provide new insights into what it means to live faithfully in today's world. Old Testament scholar Ellen Davis offers such a resource in her book "Scripture, Culture, and Agriculture: An Agrarian Reading of the Bible." In these essays, Davis explores the pervasive biblical theme of land care and puts it in conversation with some of today's best writers on the subject. This session, "The Faithful Countryside," responds to Davis' prophets and poets, both ancient and modern, and what they have to say about the practical spiritual life.

18 Mar: Cayuga Lake has approximately the same surface area as The Sea of Galilee. While their shapes are very different, long versus round, they facilitate an inquiry into experiencing our upcoming Passover Season events. As illuminated in the sixth chapter of the Gospel according to John, similarities and differences can shape our experience of spirituality as well as help us see into the spirituality of our experiences.
