MINUTES FOR POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS SEPTEMBER 9, 2018

The Monthly Meeting opened with a period of worship about 11:50 a.m.; the minutes from the August 19, 2018 meeting were read.

Attending were Ruth Bradley, Larry Buffam, Phyllis Bunker, David Connelly, Barry Kahn, Cathy Mullarney, Suzanne O'Hara, Hannah Richter, Joanne Rogers, Christopher Sammond, Andy Simkin, Jane Simkin, Paul Simkin, and Charlie Weld.

• Larry read the Building and Grounds Committee Minutes from its Sept. 2 meeting. It is as follows:

"The committee spent most of the meeting discussing various options for increasing accessibility to the meetinghouse. Various written reports by Andy and Larry of some cost estimates for different approaches were distributed to those present. We then spent some time discussing pros and cons of the different ideas.

"There was much appreciation for Andy's suggestion that we completely regrade the parking lot, carrying off much of the fill and leaving the parking area close enough in grade to the basement floor level that entrance to the basement would need no ramp. Andy's concept includes refinishing the surface of the parking lot with landscape fabric and gravel to keep it from turning to mud. It also includes adding a leach field to the septic system.

"We discussed this idea at length and decided it has definite appeal and should be explored more carefully in at least three specific ways: performing a dye test on our current septic system to see where it ends up; consulting with one or more excavators to think with them about just how our goals might best be accomplished and what it might cost; and checking on the cost of a recycled heavy plastic grid for the parking lot which allows it to be seeded to grass but resists letting cars tear it up. Concerns were expressed about not damaging the roots of the big oak tree, the potential high cost of putting in a leach field, and protecting the foundation walls of the building. Some solutions were suggested to work with all these things. they will surely provide topics for conversation with an excavator.

"Pending results of further investigations, the committee is leaning towards making this work phase one of our accessibility plan.

"We also discussed the possibilities of a small lift to move people from floor to floor without having to leave the building. We didn't discuss this for long, it being expressed that the other project best come first. But some preference for installing a lift was stated and it was pointed out that creating a new back entrance without steps would simplify our lift system significantly and probably lower the cost. Concerns were expressed that it will be seldom used, and also for where to site it and just how much prep work would go into building the tower needed to house it.

"We will continue to explore this option as a possible phase two. On the 11th, we are meeting with a sales representative from one supplier of the size lift we are considering at the meetinghouse. A few other suppliers will be consulted. Some members of the committee would like to visit Ithaca meeting and Rochester meeting, both of whom have installed lifts.

"The committee finished with a tour of the back of the building discussing details of the situation."

A Friend expressed concern about the possible high costs of the project. Another asked whether there is a difference between a lift and an elevator; there is; an elevator is in an enclosed shaft, and a lift should cost less. Another Friend reminded us that to consider a lift involves considering the additional costs of insurance as well as maintenance. About maintenance, Andy said we would have an annual maintenance contract. More information will be gathered. Renderings of possible solutions are in the Meetinghouse's Library for Friends to review.



- Ruth, our Treasurer, offered a financial report year-to-date, as of September 7. Our contributions of about \$13,000 are at about 35 percent of our annual budget. The account balances, as of today, are included.
- We heard an update about planning for the Farmington Scipio Regional Meeting's Fall Gathering

at our Meetinghouse next week, on September 15. Its theme is "Reaching the Sacred Across the Divide." Ruth Bradley will be keynote speaker using the book, "Righteous Mind: Why Good People are Divided by Politics and Religion" by Jonathon Haidt.

- The clerk reminded us that we have agreed with Regional Meeting to host an extended worship at our Meetinghouse 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday, October 13. All are welcome. Bring your own lunch.
- Reporting for Ministry and Council, Charlie said that for five consecutive Sundays beginning October 14 will be an adult education discussion based on the pamphlet "Four Doors to Meeting for Worship," by William Taber. Twenty of the pamphlets have been purchased and are available in the Library. Friends who wish to reimburse the Meeting for the \$7 cost of a pamphlet may do so.

Additionally, Charlie reported that Craig Kukuk, our Pastoral Care minister, has asked for a brief, uncompensated leave of absence. We have agreed to honor his request. Ministry and Council will coordinate Pastoral Care in Craig's absence.

We closed with brief period of silence at 1:15 p.m.

HIDDEN IN FRANCE

A Presentation at Temple Tikkun v'Or Sunday, October 14, 2:00 – 4:00 P.M. 2550 Triphammer Rd., at Burdock Hill Rd. All are welcome. Please bring friends In July, 2011 Tony Dior Gaenslen returned to Savigny le Vieux, ancestral village of the Dior family, to visit the graves of his great-grandfather and grandmother. Returning to the village square he saw a plaque that had not been there on his previous visit. It read:

"Here in Savigny le Vieux
Some thirty Jewish children
Were welcomed and protected
Between 1942 and 1945
Thanks to the courage of a few villagers
And the watchful benevolence
of the village community."

On Sunday, October 14, from 2:00 – 4:00 PM Simon Jeruchim, one of the Jewish children saved in Savigny, will exhibit wartime paintings he did while hidden in Savigny, and describe his time hidden in France

Annick Davy, whose grandmother hid two Jewish children, will describe life in a tiny Norman village during the war years.

MINISTRY AND COUNSEL ANNUAL MEETING 2017 ANNUAL REPORT

Members of Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting's Ministry and Counsel committee met together on fourteen occasions between April 23, 2017 and April 15, 2018. The Meeting's clerk, assistant clerk and

pastoral care provider attended most Ministry and Counsel meetings.

During the year, the Ministry and Counsel committee received two requests for membership from Meeting attenders. Clearness committees, appointed to evaluate the attender's readiness for membership, met with the attenders, and recommended that the Meeting receive the applicants as members. The Ministry and Counsel committee also received a request from a Meeting attender to transfer membership from Guatemala Monthly Meeting to Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting. Members of the Ministry and Counsel committee will meet with the Friend to welcome their return to Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting.

The Ministry and Counsel Committee received a letter from a member's care committee, recommending that the member's gifts in the ministry be recorded by New York Yearly Meeting. Members of the Ministry and Counsel Committee met with the Friend, reported to the monthly meeting, and, with its approval, prepared a minute recommending recording of the member's gifts in the ministry for the consideration of New York Yearly Meeting's Ministry Coordinating Committee.


The Ministry and Counsel Committee reviewed and revised the business agreement for the part-time pastoral care position, met with the pastoral care provider, and referred the 2018 agreement to the Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting for approval.

During 2017, many members, attenders, and guests from outside of the Meeting were invited to bring prepared messages to Meeting for Worship. Two members did so regularly, each typically providing leadership and a message at Meeting for Worship monthly. During 2017, one of our regular worship leaders took several months off from the work of preparing a monthly message in order to complete a graduate degree, and, after approval by the Monthly Meeting, Ministry and Counsel introduced the reading of a query from Faith and Practice in place of a prepared message one week each month. The Ministry and Counsel Committee met individually with both members who provided prepared messages regularly to discuss their experience and the Meeting community's experience of their leadership of First Day worship. The Ministry and Counsel Committee continued to support ongoing ministries at Cayuga Correctional Facility and Auburn Correctional Facility. Ministry and Counsel also ordered 15 copies

of NYYM's <u>Faith and Practice</u> for the Meeting library.

In support of individual member's search for well-being, work in ministry, and/or witness in the world, the Ministry and Counsel Committee made appointments and supervised several care and clearness committees. In addition, women's and men's spiritual nurture groups, both active and well-attended for many years, continued to meet monthly under the care of the Ministry and Counsel Committee.

In coordination with the Outreach Committee, the Ministry and Counsel Committee invited Chad Dell of Manasquan Monthly Meeting to Poplar Ridge for a First Day afternoon workshop about his experiences in strengthening Meeting communities.



CAYUGA CORRECTIONAL FACILITY WORSHIP GROUP 2017 ANNUAL REPORT

Attendance by inside men has numbered between 3 to 4 at the 6:30 pm gathering. We meet on the 2nd & 4th Friday of each month. We are fortunate to have had Phyllis Bunker join Ann, Jeff and myself as outside attenders. Check-in allows us to share the happenings since our last meeting and that is followed with 20 minutes of silent worship. We have had tea & cookies that leads us into reading and discussing the Life of George Fox. We celebrate the release of a long term attender and our Regional Meeting has offered tangible support and nearby contacts for this individual as he begins life as an outsider. This contact has resulted in a Meeting for Worship taking place on Sunday near this man's location. We hold in our hearts another attender who goes before the board shortly and if released faces deportation. This man

has family in Mexico who will welcome him, but we are concerned about him facing extended detention after release while awaiting transportation home (Mexico). We appreciate that the staff at CCF treat ourselves (volunteers) kindly and we wish we could find a way to reach a larger number of people at Cayuga Correctional.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE 2017 ANNUAL REPORT

Our committee worked on maintenance projects this year. Routine regular cleaning of the meetinghouse was contracted out during 2017, replacing a volunteer rotation that had been in place.

Many details of the meetinghouse functioning were addressed over the year as the needs became clear, including: installation of snow slide guards on the east roof to prevent dumping on the ramp; clearing the base of the ramp for safety of entrance and exit; furnace, smoke/CO monitors, and fire extinguisher servicing; installation of a new privacy door lock on the upstairs restroom; and installation of exterior trim boards on new basement windows on the west wall.

Maintenance of the meditation garden was completed on volunteer workdays to keep it looking neat and attractive.

Plans are being defined for a renovation of the south addition on the building. It is anticipated that it could be completed in 2018, pending approval of monthly meeting.

PEACE AND SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE 2017 ANNUAL REPORT

We met regularly throughout the year, generally on the first Tuesday evening of each month. Typically 6-8 committee members would attend. We tried taking turns at clerking the meetings, and one member typically hosted the meetings in her home, while another typically took the meeting notes. Activities of the committee included a monthly movie night and discussion during the winter months, with five such events this year. Films included "Growthbusters", "Bowling for Columbine", a video lecture on "Post-Carbon Music", a documentary about the Transition Movement, and attendance at the Anne Frank Tree Project Committee's screening of "Hidden Figures."

We also organized a group book-reading of "On Tyranny", and a Soup and Social discussion of the book. We also put together a Soup and Sharing presentation/discussion on the prospects of addressing climate change via a carbon tax and dividend policy.

The committee participated in the biannual priorities exercise of the Friends Committee on National Legislation. After a discussion of political concerns, the committee organized a visit to the Auburn office of Representative John Katko. Three committee members visited with two of the Congressman's staffers, outlining concerns about gun violence, local water issues, immigration policy, negative political campaigning, professionalism in government, and the need for Congress to play a role in reducing the risks of war.

In addition to the activities of the committee as a group, committee members found the group to be a source of support and encouragement for various forms of individual actions, such as letters to the editor, participation in demonstrations on women's rights, tax policy, and gun violence, supporting farmworkers, and activism regarding political concerns such as the political inequality resulting from the electoral college. Members of the committee also participated in the annual clean-up of a section of Cayuga Lake shoreline.



CELEBRATING GOD'S GIFTS

On Sunday, October 14, 2018 the ten churches of the *Southern Cayuga Wider Parish* will host "Celebrating God's Gifts: an afternoon for spirituality at Camp Gregory." This event will be held from 1:00-4:00 p.m. at Camp Casper Gregory, 1803 Lake Road, Aurora, NY. The *Wider Parish* invites everyone to experience some of the many ways of prayer, meditation, and closeness to God that is practiced by Christians of different traditions.

The afternoon will allow participants of all ages to personally experience a spiritual encounter with the Holy. The afternoon is designed for those who feel that they are spiritual but not religious. Spiritual exercises include: expressing worship through liturgical dance, joining in the songs, prayer and silence of a short Taizé worship service; creating religious art through rubbings; engaging with prayer through self-examination and spiritual poetry; encountering the Holy during a meditation walk through the woods culminating in a reflection period at the vesper site; and learning the history of the labyrinth as a way to focus personal prayer and meditation.

Participants are encouraged to dress for the weather and bring their own water bottle as water (without cups) and apples will be provided for refreshment. Small baskets will be available for monetary donations in support of local food cupboards.


