## MINUTES FOR POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS FOR MARCH 17, 2019

The Monthly Meeting opened with a period of silence about 11:40 a.m.; the minutes from the February 17 meeting were read.

Attending were Ruth Bradley, Phyllis Bunker, David Connelly, Claire Howard, Jim Frisch, Barry Kahn, Howard Nelson, Stephanie Nelson, Suzanne O'Hara, Sally Otis, Hannah Richter, Christopher Sammond, Andy Simkin, Jane Simkin, Linda Simkin, Paul Simkin, and Charlie Weld.

- The Treasurer, Ruth, indicated that there was nothing that needed to be discussed.
- For the Ministry and Council Committee, Charlie read a draft of the State of Society Report to be forwarded to New York Yearly Meeting. This year's question is "How are we making Friends' testimonies a way of life?" Monthly Meeting offered suggestions. Charlie will make a few changes to be reviewed by the Clerk and Assistant Clerk forwarded to Yearly Meeting. The final copy will be published in PRISM and posted on our website
- Christopher reported that Nominating Committee suggests three-year terms for members of the Ministry and Council Committee rather than our present five-year terms. Committee membership is demanding, and Monthly Meeting felt that a five-year term can sometimes be too much to ask of a new Committee member. Monthly Meeting approved the change, adding that members may be appointed to a term renewal of one, two, or three years. Nominating Committee will now implement the change for new appointments. Additionally, Nominating Committee will check in with Committee members annually.
- Hannah asked Monthly Meeting whether it wishes to continue our Annual Meeting practice of hearing the reports from each Monthly Meeting committee. We agreed to continue the report readings, and committees are encouraged to share the life of their year's service as well as the committees' detailed reports.
- Because Easter is on our third Sunday, Monthly Meeting agreed to delay April's Monthly Meeting a week, until April 28. It will be our Annual Meeting.

We will not hold business meeting in May because of a conflict with Spring Gathering.

- We approved Suzanne's calling to pursue having a Worship Meeting at the Genesee Country Museum Village Quaker Meetinghouse. Friends interested in participating should contact Suzanne.

We closed with a moment of silence about 1:20 p.m.

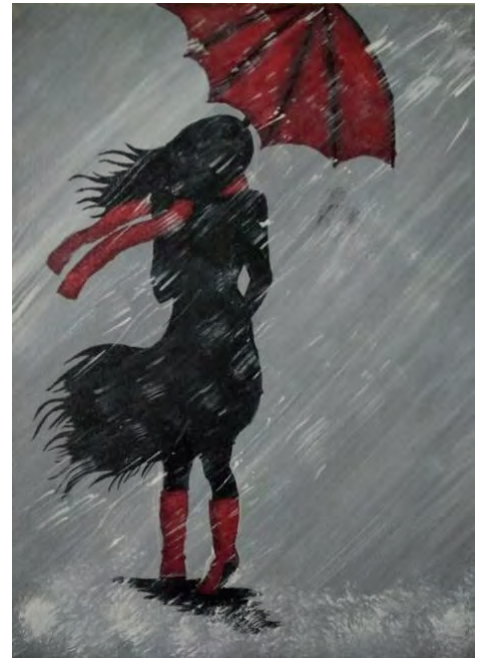

## **POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING STATE OF SOCIETY REPORT 2018**

Member and attenders of the Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting believe that the Friends' testimonies supporting Simplicity, Peace, Integrity, Community, Equality and Stewardship inform the spirit of the PRMM, and the individual lives of members and attenders in many ways. The testimonies have been explored in 2018 and 2019 during Meetings for Worship that focus on NYYM's queries, during adult education discussions about the testimonies, and monthly movie nights that are hosted by the Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting's Peace and Social Action committee.

Of the six testimonies, Community seems to be primary for many Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting Friends who rely on the sense of being part of a community that supports individual endeavors and enriches them as people. Members' and attenders' leadings are explored and clarified in clearness and care committees and in the Meeting's men's and women's spiritual nurture groups. Friends describe the informal social time that follows the rise of Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting's Meeting for Worship as evidence of the bonds that connect members of the Meeting community. Friendly Suppers which are informal gatherings in members' homes, and monthly Saturday suppers at the Meeting House offer opportunities for members and attenders to develop deeper relationships with others in the Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting community. Recent renovations and a planned, future renovation of the Meeting House invite participation by making it easier for members and attenders with physical limitations to attend Meeting House gatherings. And Poplar Ridge members and attenders—perhaps, because sustaining and growing community is a value important to the Meeting—are members of many groups outside

Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting, and work in various ways to sustain and grow these collateral communities.

The Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting's relationship with San Pedro, El Salvador, active since 2004, is an example of one of these wider projects rooted deeply in the Meeting's consciousness, and involving many Meeting members and attenders. San Pedro is a small community in a rural, mountainous area of El Salvador where approximately 40 families live—about 300 inhabitants, about 200 of which are children. Economic support, correspondence and visitation annually by a group from the Poplar Ridge community assists the San Pedro community's efforts to achieve sustainable, economic well-being.

Another example of a community event supported by PRMM is the Shepherds Play which has been performed most Decembers at the PR Meeting House for the past forty years. Many PRMM community members have participated in this medieval mystery play which is part of the Waldorf education tradition. On performance night, the Meeting House is filled with an enthusiastic audience of Friends, people from the local community and, often, spectators from Ithaca, Auburn and Syracuse. Like the Shepherds Play, the annual Halloween UNICEF fund-raising party attracts many children and their families from the local community and beyond.

Many Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting members and attenders work to support Camp Gregory, a local, summer day and overnight camp for children on the shore of Cayuga Lake. Camp Gregory board meetings are often convened at the PR Meeting House, and Meeting members and attenders work on a variety of projects at the camp.

Many Meeting members and attenders also work to support Opendore which is a Victorian-era home—one of 27 properties in the Sherwood Equal Rights Historic District—that is being restored as part of a local history museum's effort to educate the public about past area inhabitants' role in abolitionist activities and the struggle for women's suffrage.

In addition, Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting supports a worship group in Spanish, an effort to extend community and become more familiar with the lives of farm laborers in the area's dairy industry. These are a few examples of local efforts that individuals from the Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting support, hopefully,

bringing the vitality of the Meeting to these outside organizations.

The Quaker testimonies of Simplicity and Stewardship also seem to be important influences in PRMM's members' and attenders' lives. Many in the community heat with wood, utilize solar energy, have home vegetable gardens, and in other ways try to reduce their impact on the Earth's limited resources. The Meeting House's meditation garden is a visible testimony to the community's efforts to beautify and care for their immediate environment. Many members and attenders support organizations that advocate for conservation and the natural environment such as Nature Conservancy, the Adirondack Council, Audubon Society, Sierra Club etc.

The Peace testimony has been central to many PRMM's members' and attenders' sense of themselves as Quaker for generations. Recently, the Meeting's Peace and Social Action committee has engaged with our elected representative to Congress to discuss concerns about undocumented immigrants, and supported letter-writing to public officials on a variety of issues. Individuals in the Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting community have participated in public demonstrations supporting peaceful solutions to international conflicts. And before the recent mid-term elections, many members and attenders canvassed area residents, listening to and educating neighbors about political candidates' views on immigration and other issues.

Equality is also a value close to the heart of Poplar Ridge Friends. Friends note that the Meeting's ongoing participation in and support of prison worship in local correctional facilities demonstrates commitment to the idea of equality.

Being in meaningful relationship with the children that attend Meeting gatherings is also perceived as an important commitment to treating everyone as gifted and equally precious to God. The Meeting attempts to transmit the values inherent in the testimonies through weekly First Day School, participation by youth in the Youth Service Opportunity Project, and a local, environmental initiative Embrace the Lake. The Meeting's willingness and ability to extend itself to members and attenders suffering from physical or mental impairments due to age or disease is viewed by

the community as a measure of our commitment to the Equality testimony and to the testimony of Integrity.

Finally, the Meeting, through Ministry and Counsel, has invited many members and attenders to lead semi-programmed worship in acknowledgement that a wide variety of spiritual gifts encourages us to examine our own biases and seek "that of God" in everyone. Evolution Sunday, typically the Sunday in February preceding Charles Darwin's birthday, has been recognized at Poplar Ridge for many years through an appropriately-themed worship service.
