**MINUTES FOR POPLAR RIDGE
MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS
NOVEMBER 17, 2019**

Gather: present were: Christopher Sammond, Sally Otis, Phyllis Bunker, Suzanne O'Hara, Dill Otis, Scott Lockhart, Julie Lockhart, Andy Simkin, A.T. Miller, Craig Kukuk, Larry Buffam, Howard Nelson. We began with some silence.

1. October minutes: minutes were read.
2. Report on Fall Sessions / Alternate Pathways to Membership: Phyllis reported on her experience at the session with the committee working on Alternative Pathways to Membership. She touched on various questions/concerns that have been raised about the new proposal, and the responses of the members of the committee. She felt that every argument raised was effectively addressed. Christopher reported that PRMM's request for more time was delivered in a letter to the committee, but the committee decided to go forward and accept the proposal. This was done, and the committee's proposal was approved by the body of NYYM. We now have the choice to raise our objection again, or not to. If we do want to object, how are we going to do that? Other comments were made about the nature of membership and related factors and situations. It was suggested that we stay engaged and see how the new membership policy plays out, perhaps raising concerns again in the future, but not take any formal action at present. This was approved, with Paul Simkin standing aside.
3. Ministry & Counsel Report: Charlie spoke about the visit of Jonathan Vogel Borne and Kristina Keefe-Perry's visit this spring. A date needs to be chosen. They will be making a preliminary visit to get to know PRMM better on December 1-3. Charlie is putting together a schedule for the preliminary visit, including visits with committees and other members. He also expressed regret for not having been

present at the meeting when this project was approved. He said that M&C hopes that it will be a community strengthening experience. The date of March 13-15 was chosen, with April 3-5 as a snow date. In addition to their other work here, Jonathan and Kristina will also lead worship on that weekend.

4. Finance Committee: Andy presented a first draft of the 2019 budget summary with 2020 draft, not looking for approval today, but rather review and comments. The hand-out also included a review of account balances and a history of NYYM contributions. He noted that the Ann Frank Tree Project has been recommended by Peace & Social Action to be added to the charitable contribution, after review of three requests. There was some discussion of provisions and history of specific fund accounts. It was decided to rename the Youth Fund as the Houck Youth Fund. Christopher asked whether we want to recommend to the Finance Committee that there be any increase in our NYYM donation. Friends were not clear to do so.

Andy reported on research into investment possibilities. He distributed a hand-out on Friends Fiduciary Short Term Investment Fund, a socially responsible investment fund. He asked for approval to go ahead with this fund for our \$30,000 investment, authorizing the Clerk of the Meeting to sign the investment agreement, and authorizing the Clerk and Treasurer as signatories . This was approved.

5. Peace & Social Action: Larry reported on the request to write a minute in support of Claire Grady, recently convicted of crimes while engaged in civil disobedience. The letter was read, some small changes were made, and the letter was approved to be signed by the Clerk and sent, prior to sentencing, to the court. A copy will also be sent to the person who made the request.

6. Building Committee: Andy reported that the committee met and reviewed the parking lot/rear vestibule project, and things are in good shape. There has been discussion of accessibility issues, and the possibility of installing a lift at the NE corner of the building. Further investigation is taking place. Improvement/insulation of the south addition of the building is also under consideration.
7. Youth Committee: Scott reported on the Halloween Carnival. \$263 was raised for UNICEF. The number of attendees was down somewhat, but the event went well. He thanked all who helped out. It was noted that this was the 30th year of the Halloween Carnival tradition, a positive community event. He announced that December 22 will be the annual Christmas pageant.
8. FSRM Listening Session: Christopher reported that the Region's Ministry & Counsel Committee is offering a session for listening to what has life in our meetings, taking place as a conference call on November 18. He asked if anyone would be able to participate. No one was able to do so.
9. Larry noted that Peace & Social Action has asked that the librarian make DVDs of movies used for movie nights available in the meeting house library. They can be checked out with the same process as books.
10. Sally asked about the directory up-dating, how to determine who should be kept on the list. It was suggested that the pastoral care provider be given a list and be asked to contact those in question. She also noted that the phone tree has been updated but not yet distributed.
11. Meeting closed with some silence.

NYYM FALL SESSIONS MINUTES ONLINE

Several important decisions were reached, including the approval of a new form of membership, movement toward divesting the YM's assets from fossil fuels, and approval of a budget with funding for an interim Young Adult Field Secretary for the first half of 2020. The operating budget will be revisited at Spring Sessions.

BOLIVIA QUAKER EDUCATION FUND (BQEF) QUAKER STUDY TOUR

Bolivia Quaker Education Fund is sponsoring a two-week tour of Bolivia and its rich culture and astounding natural beauty, July 9-22, 2020. This year there will be an added emphasis on studying climate change and its impact. The tour will be led by Dr. Stanley Blanco, the founder of a non-profit to improve Bolivian children's health who is also a bilingual tour leader and international aid manager, assisted by Alicia Lucasi of BQEF and Guido Quispe, a BQEF graduate and environmental specialist. The tour is inspired by the work of Jennie M. Ratcliffe, an environmental research scientist, activist, and Quaker who makes connections between peace, justice, and ecological sustainability in her book, *Nothing Lowly in the Universe: An Integral Approach to the Ecological Crisis*. Former graduates of our scholarship program will be among those presenting and assisting with the tour.

Come to learn about Bolivia's history and culture, from pre-Incan traditions to the emergence of modern Bolivia. Travelers will visit Quaker communities in the Altiplano region to witness environmental adaptations in the high plains. Participants will fly into Sucre, a UNESCO World Heritage site and former capital. The itinerary will include La Paz, the stunning salt flats of Solar de Uyuni, Quaker communities in the Altiplano, the pre-Incan ruins of Tiwanaku, and Lake Titicaca, ending in the current capital, La Paz. 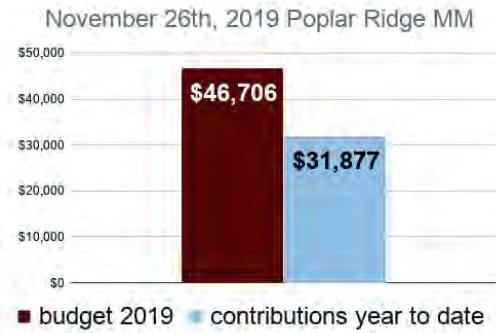
